Have you owned an English Shepherd before, done research on the breed, or met one?

What do you hope that your puppy will bring to your family or farm, because of the breed you've chosen?

Will your pup be learning on a farm? *A farm is not a requirement, but due to the history of the breed, farm placements may be considered first. (About half of our pups go to active family/suburban homes, depending on the litter.)

For potential farm dogs, are you looking for herding ability, hunting ability (rodents, coons, tracking, etc), guarding your property, companion for small children?

If on a farm, what livestock will your pup need exposure to? (This helps me as I introduce puppies to the barn cats, poultry and livestock here.)

Do you have a business on your farm (or in your home) where your pup will need to be interacting with visitors on a regular basis?

Will customers, friends or family members bring other dogs to your property?

For suburban pups, what qualities are you hoping for, which will fit your lifestyle? (Will your pup come home to an active suburban lifestyle, therapy or obedience training, agility training, etc?)

Is your puppy's new home an apartment? If you rent, do you have permission from your landlord to have a dog (and more specifically, a dog that will be 45-60 pounds at maturity)?

Is there fencing in place, for a safe place to run and/or train?

Who usually lives at home, and who visits frequently. (This helps us to watch all the pups as visitors interact with them, with your situation in mind. Children, teenagers, workmen, older family members, boisterous visitors, any types of visitors or family members that you care to list will help us as we observe the litter over the few months that they are with us.)

What other dogs are at home, or in the groups that visit frequently? Please include male/female information and their breeds or size. (One example could be...an older female English Shepherd and a family is considering a young female ES to join the group.)

Is there anyone in your home reluctant to bring in a puppy at this time? Please explain if so:

Do you currently have a pet-vet? Please give their info below, and feel free to also give them our contact info.

Describe what might be a typical day for your puppy once he or she is part of your farm and/or family?

Have you had a dog in the past that you've needed to give back to a shelter, return to a breeder, or had to rehome? Can you describe in general terms what the circumstances were? (I am in this category, to my dismay, and no judgment is intended, but I also need to ask...)

If you cannot keep this pup at any point in the future, will you agree to contact us and allow us to either take the pup back as a foster, or help in the rehoming process?

Preference: Are you looking for a male or a female... Will you consider either, if there are puppies of both sexes that could be a good fit for you? (Please note here, we typically choose not to place a pup in a home where there is already a same-sex dog in residence).

Color/markings: Do you have a color preference, size preference, temperament preference? (We match pups to potential farms and families for personality and working ability. If two or three pups seem a good match for one particular family or farm home, it's good to know the preferences as each is considered, but we will not place a pup solely on markings or color.)

***Pups are not placed only on the request of color or markings, but on the suitability of working traits or companion temperament. Please note that when a deposit is accepted after pups are born, we will be watching the whole litter, to see which is the best fit. It is not always possible to reserve a pup solely on color, and have the temperament or working ability be the best fit for the situation described.

Are you hoping to breed your dog in the future? (I watch for certain things in a companion dog, farm dog, etc, and a future representative of the breed in a breeding setting is another quality that I'm watching the pups for.)

PLEASE NOTE: Only one or two pups from any given litter *may* be chosen to place in potential breeding homes, or reserved as pick of the litter. This is at the breeder's discretion, and will be based on a different framework of conversations and evaluations.

Thanks so much for your time. We look forward to seeing which puppy might be the one to join your farm and/or family!!!

Please mail a completed copy of this application to us at the address below. (No payment is due at this time. Laura will let you know that the application was received, and that you are on the list to call when pups are born.) If you find a pup sooner than our Evening Song litter is born, please let us know so that our list can be adjusted for others who may be waiting.

Only after pups have arrived, and contact/phone call has been made, will deposits be requested.

Pricing in 2025 is \$1150 for an Evening Song pup, with half sent as a deposit after pups are born. A deposit at that time reserves a "spot" in the litter, but not a specific pup. A discount of \$100 is given if the application is submitted before the pups are born.

Visits are encouraged, but not mandatory. If the personality of the pups are shaping up to be different than what you had hoped for, I will let you know before you travel to visit the litter, whenever possible.

Evaluation of puppies, communication through Facebook or e-mail, and another phone call will occur during the first 6-7 weeks, and placement decisions are made mutually around 7 weeks of age. At times, I might ask for your first, second and third choice in the litter, as we work through placements for the best match of all the puppies to the homes or farms they seem best suited for.

Puppies typically leave for their new homes at or around 8 weeks of age after their first vet appointment. For reasons requiring time past the 8 week mark, please check with us as soon as possible, so that we can discuss the pup staying a week or two longer to fit your schedule.
